When Do You Say Something? How Do You Say Something?

I was on the light rail heading to the Baltimore/Washington airport recently. The cars were filling up, primarily with minorities as we passed through downtown Baltimore. Eventually, a Caucasian man entered our car, surveyed the available seats, and plopped himself down next to me. He looked pretty scruffy, perhaps mid-30s. He struck up a broken conversation which rambled, asking me where I was going and that sort of thing. Somehow, the conversation turned to the deterioration of Baltimore, and he was looking for targets to blame. He mentioned some ranking official, "a Jew," who did something or other. That came up again, and then the topic turned to people dragging the city down, and he said, "Because you know there is only one race." And he didn't mean human.

And I didn't say anything. Those who know me know I have plenty to say, but in this situation, in this confined space, with a man I surmised was of marginal thinking ability, I said nothing. In that moment, I could not imagine any positive outcome from speaking out. Perhaps you've been in that situation, too.

Now I'm not sure I made the correct decision.

When do you say something? *How* do you say something, something that will be meaningful, impactful? How do you confront deep-seated ignorance in a manner as non -confrontational as possible? I have fought for equality on all fronts ever since I got 'woke' at college. Equality with regard to race, religion, gender, physical ability, and mental ability. I'm not interested in fisticuffs, but verbal engagement is important. I will likely not change the other person's mind, but he or she will know that I do not agree and do take offense.

We are all familiar with Martin Niemöller's famous quotation:

First they came for the Socialists, and I did not speak out— Because I was not a Socialist. Then they came for the Trade Unionists, and I did not speak out— Because I was not a Trade Unionist. Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out— Because I was not a Jew. Then they came for me—and there was no one left to speak for me.

This is a difficult time for all of us. Everyone of has friends, maybe even family, who at some point have spoken out or dog-whistled about minorities and members of other religions, especially those of the Muslim faith. Do we confront them? Ignore them? Laugh it off? The questions are important, because many of those attacks have turned to us, to the Jews. And these attacks are coming from national leaders, state leaders, local leaders, news outlets, online acquaintances, family members, and friends.

Hillel the Elder said: "If I am not for myself, who will be for me?" I proudly wear a shirt that says: "We the People... means ALL of us." So my question is: "If I am not for ALL of us, then whom am I NOT for?"

I pray we all find the courage to examine our own prejudices and prepare ourselves to speak up ... while we still can. We should never take our liberties for granted.

At Home & At College - Anti-Semitism and Anti-Israel Sentiment is Alive and Well

Recently, I made a routine visit to one of the furniture stores I sell to. While in the store, in the gallery of the manufacturer I represent, an older gentleman started asking questions about the product line he and his wife were interested in. I was giving them the quality story when their designer, who had left them for a few minutes, walked over. He said, "I see you've met the rep for this dining company." This is how the consumer responded, "Dave and I are now good friends. In fact, we're going for lunch afterwards, but we know who won't be paying, based on his last name."

How do you respond to that? I pictured this guy wearing a white sheet. And since he obviously had money, his would have been a fitted sheet.

On another serious note, Carol Anne and I attended the recent Annual President's Dinner at the Tampa Jewish Federation. The guest speaker was Frank Luntz, PhD. He was named one of the four "Top Research Minds" in Business Week and "the hottest pollster" by The Boston *Globe*. He's been profiled on *60 Minutes* and *Good Morning America*. He has appeared on *Meet the Press, Nightline*, and *Face the Nation*. He is the three-time best-selling author of *Words That Work, What Americans Really Want... Really* and *Win*. He received his doctorate in politics at the age of 25 from Oxford University and was named a fellow at Harvard University's Institute of Politics in 1993. This guy is an expert, and he's a Jew.

To keep this as short as possible, I'm only sharing some of the stats he showed us. If interested, I will make all the slides, with his additional commentary, available to you. I've explain how at the end. Dr. Luntz began, "The problem is anti-semitism, and the problem is happening across America, and it truly is significant." Over a period of years, we conducted interviews of college students all across America - Kent State, Berkeley, USC, James Madison, FSU, University of Oregon, etc. Student after student saw examples of anti-semitism on their campuses."

The first slide he shared was that of a generic 21-year-old female.

"She is the focus. The issue with Israel is not with most young men. It is with most young women. And the greater the anger, the more likely they are to be on the left, rather than on the right. Israel has lost its support on the left because of politics and because we weren't careful about how we communicate. For those of you who don't think this is an issue, all I have to say is one word to you, which is 'settlements.' Someone in Israel came up with the word settlements. If they had been called 'suburbs,' Americans wouldn't have freaked out. It was called a 'wall' rather than a 'barrier.' If they thought about what they were saying, it would not have been an issue, but it has become one. I take no side on policy, I take no side on politics. When it comes to Israel, there are no Republicans. There are no Democrats.

There are only Jews. There are only Americans, and we have to stand together."

It doesn't mean we don't disagree. But we have to be careful about the words that we use and how we communicate. And if you want to know how bad it is, only 28% of college students are now specifically on the side of Israel.



It's not that the rest of them are pro-Palestinian; it's that they have become neutral. They have decided not to make a decision.

When I was a student at the University of Pennsylvania, everybody was pro-Israel. You couldn't find people who were opposed to it. That's the way it was on most college campuses. Today, pro-Israel is the minority point of view. Students have decided they don't want to be involved in the conflict anymore. That they don't want to take sides, and mark my words, if they don't take sides, that's hostile to the Jewish State, and we cannot let that happen.

What American College Students Believe

• 22% are more pro-Palestinian than pro-Israeli. These are 2018 numbers.

34% - one third, who won't validate Israel's right to exist!
43% would boycott Israel to curb mistreatment of Palestinians. That's the number you have to follow in terms of BDS (Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions.)



A MITZVAH TO READ A MISHNAH?

Pirkei Avot is a collection of ethical writings and maxims from the rabbis. Pirkei Avot loosely translates as "Chapters of the Fathers," though I think of it as "Chapters (or Ethics) of the People." (This gender-neutral twist on the title will surprise no one who knows me.)

Pirkei Avot is six short chapters that are easy to read and filled with ethical degrees worth grappling with in our contemporary lives. As one example, the words, "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? And when I am for myself, what am 'I'? And if not now, when?" are found in the first chapter of • Sunday April 29: Chapter 4 the Pirkei Avot. and in the second chapters readers will find, "It is not incumbent upon you to complete the work, but neither are you at liberty to desist from it." One tradition is to read

the Pirkei Avot in the weeks between Pesach and Shavuot.

This year at Congregation Beth Shalom, people interested in reading Pirkei Avot together between Pesach and Shavuot will gather Sunday mornings from 9:30 am until 10:30 am to discuss a chapter of the book. All are invited to join in these lively and reflective discussions about Jewish ethics inspired by reading Pirkei Avot.

Here is the schedule:

- Sunday April 8: Chapter 1
- Sunday April 15: Chapter 2
- Sunday April 22: Chapter 3
- Sunday May 6: Chapter 5 & 6

(We will combine the last two chapters to avoid Mother's Day.) Join any or all of the meetings. No commitment re-

quired, no prerequisites to enter. Come if you have read the chapter-and come if you haven't. Jewish ethics are for everyone. We will examine these ethics together and consider how they relate to our lives today.

We've continued our Bible and Bagels with Rabbi Richard Address on certain Saturday mornings and we have occasional Friday night Torah readings.





DONATIONS

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- **Building Fund**: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- Endowment Fund: Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/ restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- **Religious School Scholarship Fund:** These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- **Rabbi's Discretionary Fund**: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.
- Youth Group Fund: a fund that supports the ongoing engagement of post b'nai mitzvah youth, providing meaningful and fun experiences for our teens, and keeping them connected to their Jewish community.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- Bricklets: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- **Tree of Life**: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- Yahrzeit Plaque: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$250. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.


