From the Rabbi

R-E-S-P-E-C-T - Find Out What It Means To Me

In the past year, I have fallen in love with yoga. I look forward to my twice weekly class and try not to miss it. At the end of class last week the teacher made an announcement. She had heard that while we were waiting for her to arrive the previous week some of the group had been talking politics and expressed some strong views. She asked us, in the spirit of yoga, to make the class a politics free zone. Everybody readily agreed and several people chimed in with stories about how they couldn't talk with even close friends and family members about current events because the disagreements were so strong, and there was so little respect for different opinions that the conversations were unpleasant.



I've been thinking of this ever since; I find unspeakably sad that conversation with people who hold passionately different views from our own is virtually impossible. Sad, but not surprising. I see it in our community too. I see it on social media; I saw it in the debate over the agreement with Iran on nuclear weapons; and, I see it at Oneg Shabbat when one person turns away from a political conversation and makes a snide comment or rolls his/her eyes at the views of another.

It's not the Jewish way. Not because we don't disagree – even passionately – but because disagreement should not end or limit relationships. Perhaps the two greatest debaters in Jewish history were the first century rabbis known as Hillel and Shammai. Their personalities and disagreements were strong, practical and vehement. And yet, the children of one group still married the children of the other – the Talmud's way of saying their fundamental relationships were not altered. Why do we even bother to record both views? "To teach future generations that a person should not [stubbornly] adhere to his words" (Mishnah Eduyot 1:4).

This is the kind of idea that most of us agree with, and then ignoring self-examination, place the blame on others. We may not be able to change Facebook or American culture, but we can embrace *kavod* (respect) within our own community. This isn't about refraining from political conversations (which is the easy route) or always agreeing with each other (which is neither practical nor beneficial) but listening with respect, openness, and the assumption that the intent of the other is worthy.

One more Thing

I am deeply troubled by the current climate in which all members of the Islamic community are condemned for their religious beliefs. The paper is full of stories about women who wear the *hijab* feeling threatened, about acts of violence at local mosques, and an atmosphere that has created fear amongst Muslims. Judaism believes that all people are fashioned in God's image and our individual actions determine if that image is reflected in the world. The idea (and ideal) of America is one that affirms that no group should be discriminated against on the basis of religion. We as Jews know what it is when our nation fails to live up to that idea. It is up to us – Jews, Americans—to speak up against our fellow citizens who strive to condemn and discriminate against all Muslims.

If you disagree with me – I hope you'll do so with respect.

My Attempt at Jewish Guilt

I have never been a master at the art of Jewish guilt. Some say it is genetic, some say it is environmental, some say it is practice makes perfect.

Whichever it is, I do not possess that skill. So here's my attempt; tell me how I do.

At the beginning of the year, the rabbi, the board and I lay out the direction of the temple for the entire year. We discuss the services we are providing versus the income and expenses it takes to provide those services. For the past two years we've had a very simple plan:

- 1. Provide a caring nurturing community.
- 2. Provide spiritual, educational, and social opportunities for all age groups and people in various life stages.
- Highlight the value of what each member receives from CBS.

If we follow this plan and accentuate the positive, the donations will come in. Over the past year and a half we had a range of services from UT 25, Scholar in Residence, Dinner with the Tribe, Community Conversations, enhanced religious school offerings, and an increase in the quality of educational opportunities for temple members. We have also increased the quality of our Friday night services through Shabbat Alive, visiting Cantor programs, and our Rabbi emphasizing relevant topics. We continue to have quality music for Kol Nidre, Simchat Torah and many other festivities. Also, let us not forget the birthday pens!

The list is endless as are the opportunities for each member to grow spiritually, educationally, and socially.

Our plan worked! We have received enough pledges to sustain us into the near future, which is great news but we cannot survive on pledges alone.

As many of you know, I have held the position of treasurer or president of this community for

the past seven years. During this tenure, we received payments on people's earlier commitments and in greater denominations than this year. I do not have the answer to why this is, but it puts our congregation's finances in serious jeopardy. We cannot continue to run the programming for our temple without the timely submission of these pledges.



I never beg for money and I never will. I do believe that if you have made a commitment to our temple, it is your responsibility to uphold that commitment. All I ask is that you please pay as much as you can of your commitment at this time.

We are working on faith that you will honor your commitment so that we do not have to cut programming.

The Lifelong Learning Committee has some exciting programs scheduled for 2016.!

On two consecutive Tuesdays in January Rabbi Torop will be presenting "Israel Beyond the Headlines." If you are confused by what you read in the news or are not sure what to think, join us to learn and discuss the situation in Israel. We will look at the modern day challenges ranging from asylum seekers and poverty to security while sharing a variety of opinions and interpretations of the complex reality that is the State of Israel. Dates are January 12 and 19 from 7:30p.m. to 9:00p.m.

The Committee will be presenting a **Night at the Movies** on **Saturday, February 6** with a free movie, free snacks, and an opportunity to smooze. The movie being viewed is "Regina." It is the true story of Regina Jonas, the world's first woman rabbi who lived in Berlin. In the 1930s, her greatest dream was to become a rabbi. She felt that she was born to be a rabbi, but women were barred from becoming a rabbi according to the Jewish laws. You will be deeply impressed by her short life story, which was full of struggles. Rachel Weisz as the inspiring figure Regina, makes this story complete. The use of archive and experimental editing techniques add

a magical layer which will pull you, the audience, into this unique story.

Have you ever read a book that has had a major impact on your thought processes? The Lifelong Learning Committee will be revisiting such a classic. Join the Committee in its presentation and discussion of Chaim Potok's "The Chosen" on Friday, February 12 at 7:45p.m. The novel was first published in 1967 and released as a movie in 1981. Interestingly, it was also a short-lived off-Broadway musical, presented briefly in 1988. The novel follows the narrator Reuven Malter and his friend Daniel Saunders, as they grow up in the Williamsburg neighborhood in Brooklyn, New York. The story takes place over a period of six years, beginning in 1944 when the protagonists were fifteen years old. It is set against the backdrop of the historical events of the time: the death of President Roosevelt, the end of World War II, the revelation of the Holocaust in Europe, and the struggle for the creation of the state of Israel. Literary themes within the book include the pursuit of truth in a gray world, the strength of friendship, and the importance of fatherson bonds. Another important theme is the contrast of tradition to modernity.

Donations

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- Building Fund: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- Endowment Fund: Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/ restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- Religious School Scholarship Fund: These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- Rabbi's Discretionary Fund: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- Bricklets: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- Tree of Life: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- Yahrzeit Plaque: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$250. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.

Unless otherwise noted by you, your gift will be acknowledged in the Kibbitzer the month following its receipt. If your donation is incorrectly listed or omitted, please notify the temple office immediately.
