Learning in the Woods

As is often the case for the July Kibbitzer, I am writing my article from Camp Coleman, where I spend two weeks every year as rabbinic faculty (along with several staff members and campers from CBS). Jewish summer camp was formative in my personal Jewish journey, and all of the current research suggests that Jewish summer camp has a profound impact on the Jewish identity of today's kids. It is truly a



blessing for me to contribute to the camp community – to help young people create meaningful and innovative worship experiences; to begin every meal with *hamotzi* and end every meal with *birkat hamazon*; to discuss Jewish identity with teenagers; and to create personal 'sacred space' boxes with middle schoolers. On Shabbat, all 600+ members of camp will be dressed in white; we'll say the blessings, counselors will bless their campers, and we'll sing and dance. It is – for many of the kids – the only time they know the joy of living a 24/7 Jewish life, and, for the counselors, it is an amazing chance to become Jewish role models and teachers. For all of these reasons – and many more – I love Jewish summer camp and believe in it passionately.

Coleman works very hard to create a sense of community – in each bunk, in each unit and with the camp as a whole. Being here at camp is also an opportunity to reflect and ask questions that pertain to our community and Beth Shalom. Coleman articulates four essential Jewish values that are woven into every part of camp. These values are displayed visually, emphasized in dialogue and programs, and modeled in behavior. The values are:

- *Kehillah*/community. Every activity and interaction is an opportunity to turn a group of individuals into a tightly knit community.
- *Kavod*/respect. All of our actions and words must model respect for others, no matter how different from us they appear, as creatures of God.
- *Chesed*/kindness. Above all else, in our actions with one and other, we must be kind. A simple, but all-too-often absent, guiding principle.
- *Shalom*/peace. In many ways, this is the end result of the other three values. In a place that tries to create a sense of community, where everyone and everything is treated with respect and kindness, peace and wholeness will replace conflict and criticism.

If we were to pick three or four core values for Beth Shalom, what would they be? Our mission and vision statement include words like "welcoming," "caring," and "inclusive." Are these some of our core values? What are others? And once we identify those core values, how could we use them to shape and guide our collective behavior, choices and words? If you haven't been to our website (<u>www.bethshalom-brandon.org</u>) in a while, I invite you to take a look and read our mission statement and vision statement. Think about our core values – what they are, what they should be, what you'd like them to be. Share them with me. Let's learn from the magic of summer

camp.

When I was growing up, my dad had his dental office adjacent to our house. Besides the constant "snow" on our TV set when my dad was using the drill and the constant calls at all times of day (it is amazing how people thought I knew about dentistry because I was his son), there was a quote on the wall of his office that I will always remember:

"Do not criticize a man unless you have walked a mile in his moccasins" — Old Indian Proverb

That expression was very influential in shaping my thoughts and the way I approach understanding people. Preconceived ideas are in our minds. and it is our responsibility to combat the tendency to categorize others. We must engage other people in open dialect without bias. You never know about a person's situation unless you have lived his/her life. Until you have struggled their struggles, experienced their upbringings, and lived their day to day lives, we have no right to judge others.

Hank talked about changing the culture of our temple community. Rabbi teaches us that talking about a person is gossiping. I have had a unique perspective as past Treasurer on how people make assumptions about people's finances, work ethic, family situation, etc. I have seen well-intentioned individuals talk about scenarios in a group setting, unaware that they are demeaning people in that very group. I witnessed people becoming disenfranchised because of unintentional, hurtful words.

As Treasurer, I learned that the more I listened to congregants, the more I could help them.. and the more they could help our temple.

To change the financial culture of our temple, we must first understand individual situations without judgment. To change the social culture, we must first understand congregant needs and not assume we know what is wanted. To be a caring culture, we need to first listen with empathy and compassion to congregant concerns.

As President, I am convinced that the more I (and the board) listen and understand the true issues, the more we will be able to help the temple. You have my

commitment that we will respect your perspective and appreciate your commitment to helping the temple.

Your board needs to understand what our community wants – to walk a mile in your moccasins. We need to listen actively, hear your voice and understand we have an opportunity



to learn from what you say. It starts with honest, open, respectful dialogue. It fosters trust and involvement. These are the building blocks of a strong temple foundation. Ultimately, it will enhance your temple experience and will enhance our experience also.

All of us have something in common - a commitment to our unique Jewish experience. This commonality fuses us together no matter the road we have walked. When we respect the different journeys travelled, we can enjoy the next road together, with all the twists and turns of CBS life.

University of South Florida Parkinson's Disease Center teams with Michael J. Fox Foundation to study major genetic cause of Parkinson's Disease in Jewish individuals: How you can help

LRRK2 mutations

Identifying and understanding the causes of Parkinson's disease is a critical step along the path to a cure. There are now over a dozen genetic mutations that have been found to cause or increase the risk of Parkinson's disease, but these mutations only account for about 10% of all cases of Parkinson's disease in the general population. Thus, for many individuals the cause remains unknown. Nonetheless, one genetic mutation, known as LRRK2, appears to be fairly common, especially in the Jewish population.

It has been discovered that individuals with a genetic mutation in one copy of their LRRK2 gene are at increased risk to develop Parkinson disease. In the general population, only 1-2% of individuals with Parkinson disease have a LRRK2 mutation. However, among individuals who are of Ashkenazi Jewish descent, approximately 15% of individuals with Parkinson disease have a LRRK2 mutation. Thus, in individuals of Ashkenzi Jewish descent who have Parkinson's disease, a LRRK2 genetic mutation appears to be the cause in approximately 15% of individuals.

This risk to develop Parkinson disease increases with age. At age 50, the risk to develop Parkinson's disease in an individual with a LRRK2 mutation is around 10-20%; this risk increases to 50-80% by age 80. Some people with a LRRK2 mutation may never develop Parkinson disease. It is likely other risk factors are needed for an individual to develop Parkinson disease in addition to the LRRK2 mutation.

LRRK2 mutations are inherited in an autosomal dominant fashion. This means that both males and females can pass on and inherit the mutation. Each child of a person with a LRRK2 mutation has a 50% or 1 in 2 chance to inherit the mutation. Similarly, this individual has a 50% or 1 in 2 chance to not inherit the mutation from their parent.

The PPMI study

The University of South Florida Health Byrd Parkinson's Disease Center is a clinical site for the Parkinson's Progression Markers Initiative (PPMI), a large-scale study exclusively focused on identifying and validating Parkinson's disease biomarkers. Following the successful completion of recruitment for the original study and launch of a pre-motor arm in 2013, PPMI has expanded to study certain Parkinson'srelated genes.

Over the past decade, studies of the genetics of Parkinson's disease (PD) have revolutionized the pursuit of a "disease-modifying" treatment – a therapy that can slow or stop the progression of PD. Therefore, studying people with Parkinson's and their families is essential to help researchers identify genetic traits that may contribute to the onset and progression of PD.

Today, PPMI (<u>www.michaeljfox.org/ppmi</u>) is seeking people with Parkinson's and their family members to help researchers identify genetic traits that may contribute to the onset and progression of PD. Specifically, PPMI is currently studying the connection between PD and having a mutation in the LRRK2 gene – the single most common genetic contributor to PD.

How you can participate:

People with and without PD who meet the following criteria may be eligible for genetic counseling and testing at no cost to determine if they may qualify for this study.

People with Parkinson's disease who are of Eastern European (Ashkenazi) Jewish, North African Berber, or Basque ancestry. Please call Kelly at 813-396-0755.

Individuals without PD who are related to someone with PD AND who are of Eastern European (Ashkenazi) Jewish, North African Berber, or Basque ancestry. Please fill out a brief online questionnaire at <u>www.michaelifox.org/genetics</u>.

If you have been tested and know that you have a LRRK2 mutation, contact Kelly Tehan, PA-C at 813-396-0755. You can also learn more about genetics and PPMI by calling (888) 830-6299.

Genetic Testing: What's Involved?

Genetic testing is a process of examining a person's DNA. Among other things, genetic testing can reveal changes in your genes that may cause illness or disease. PPMI will provide free genetic counseling and testing for a LRRK2 mutation free of charge to people who qualify to participate. Here is a summary of the genetic testing process in PPMI.

Preparation: Talking to a genetic counselor about the process is an important first step. Together, you'll discuss family history, motivations for getting tested, possible outcomes, and whether you'll decide to know the results of your test.

The Test: The test simply requires a single blood draw to determine whether or not there is a mutation in your LRRK2 gene. Your blood sample is sent to a central laboratory for testing.

Receiving Your Results: You will be contacted by a PPMI representative once your results are in. All volunteers will be invited for further genetic counseling free of charge and some may be invited to participate in additional tests and evaluations.

A decision to play a part in PPMI is an opportunity to join forces with thousands of families worldwide committed to speeding scientific progress toward a cure for Parkinson's disease. PPMI is a \$60 million study and is sponsored by The Michael J. Fox Foundation for Parkinson's Research (MJFF).



organization called NFTY. NFTY stands for the North American Federation of Temple Youth, which was established just over 70 years ago with the mission of engaging our Jewish youth during a critical time in their development as individuals, as community members, and as Jews.

BeSTY is just one of over 750 Reform congregations reaching out to over 10,000 high school age young people across the continent, which is divided into 19 regions. We are part of NFTY-STR, or Southern Tropical Region, which encompasses most of the state of Florida, with the exception of the panhandle and it also includes the Bahamas.

Four times each year, the region hosts Kallot for rising 9th through 12th graders – fall, winter, spring and a leadership training. The Fall, Spring and Leadership Training kallot are hosted by synagogues throughout the region and students are home housed by host congregation families. This type of experience provides opportunities for bonding and fellowship at the family level, and many times it establishes lifelong relationships outside of our youth's local community. Each of these events is held over a weekend, Friday to Sunday, and includes Shabbat worship designed with youth in mind. Other activities over the course of the weekend are designed by the hosting temple and include teambuilding, problem-solving, self -reflection and development exercises as well as fun! Winter Kallah is an extended event during winter break, and is held at a hotel in Orlando.

During the rest of the year, each chapter sets its own calendar with activities to include (in no particular order) service to the synagogue, service to the community, self-development, Jewish education and exploration, and of course, a selection of activities just designed to have fun. Every year each chapter elects a board of officers who lay the path for the chapter to take, and an advisor plays and active role in the development of the leadership of the group, and a supervisory role to its activities. This year's board includes President David Goldfarb, Programming Vice President Andrew Pelk, Social Action Vice President Jamie Karr, Religious & Cultural Vice President Justin Shaw, Membership Vice President Madi Oppolo, and Communications Vice President Cori Posner under the advisement of Mags Oldman. The Board meets monthly to plan and evaluate the course of the group and will be announcing the fall line up and dues structure by the end of summer.

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Donations

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- **General Fund** (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- **Building Fund**: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- **Endowment Fund:** Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/ restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- Religious School Scholarship Fund: These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- **Rabbi's Discretionary Fund**: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- **Bricklets**: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- **Tree of Life**: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- **Yahrzeit Plaque**: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$250. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.

Unless otherwise noted by you, your gift will be acknowledged in the Kibbitzer the month following its receipt. If your donation is incorrectly listed or omitted, please notify the temple office immediately.


