In Time and Out of Time: On Jewish Rituals and Temporality

I write this piece on the last day of Sh'vat anticipating the month of Adar. When you read this, the month of Adar will be half over and everyone will be anticipating the middle of Nisan when we take our first taste of matzah during a Pesach seder. Like many people, Pesach is my favorite holiday. I anticipate with glee all the rituals of the holiday—even cleaning! Since I am not orthodox about my practice or my cleaning, good enough always suffices. This year, throughout March to use the Gregorian calendar for a minute, I will complete the necessary cleaning for the seder, find all the ritual objects for the event as well as the illustrative objects (small plastic lambs and bugs the contribute to the storytelling), purchase a brisket and other celebratory food, and anticipate people gathering around the table and the first taste of matzah on my tongue.

Every year the same activities happen in preparation for Pesach, and every year the preparations are different as they have different meanings, different burdens, and different celebrations in their particular moment in time. Repetition is both similar, exposing the sameness of our years, and dissimilar, making difference more stark through the process of repetition. Jewish rituals, like the Passover seder, offer a way to enter Judaism and to celebrate the circularity of the year. In Jewish life, each year revolves around the holidays and the rituals for their celebration, and, of course, Shabbat and its rituals anchor each week. This weekly and annual repetition of holidays marks both the passage of time and the significance of time in our lives. By recognizing and marking time, we individually and as a community create meaning and renewal.

Jewish rituals and the meanings they create are both "in time" with the lunar calendar and "out of time" with the calendar that rules most of our lives. They are "in time" for people living inside the lunar calendar (a number that in our contemporary lives is small—if even existent!) and "out of time" for people living with the Gregorian calendar. For instance, I had to look the information up on www.hebcal.com to know what the month was and when I was writing these words. This duality of being in time and out of time is one I return to often as a metaphor. What is happening in life that is "in time" and what is happening that is "out of time"?

This period at CBS where we are without a rabbi is a moment when our congregational life is both "in time" and "out of time." The board, the search committee, and the ritual committee all work with extraordinary commitment and grace to maintain our religious community and the rituals that bind us together; they keep us collectively "in time," observing Shabbat, celebrating the days and weeks and milestones of our communal lives. But the absence of a rabbi is palpable; it is unsettling to not have a single figure on the bimah each Friday night—and to not even know what the face of the future rabbi will look like on the bimah in the future! We are collectively "out of time" in our congregational life as we thoughtfully conduct this search and select our next rabbi.

Yet, being "out of time" is something fundamental to our religious practice—a point of pride even for contemporary Jews. Being "out of time" and experiencing the absence of a rabbi at Congregation Beth Shalom wakes us up to the importance of ritual and the congregation in our lives. As we collectively move forward in selecting another religious and community leader, may we anticipate the joy of a Jewish year with the new rabbi as we anticipate the taste of matzah on our tongues.

Finally, while the repetition of the holidays and of the year in general fills me with joy and satisfaction, there is one repetition that I am eager to see end—and that I must comment on given the day I am writing this piece. Our neighbors in Broward County experienced a terrible tragedy: another mass shooting at a school. Seventeen young people are dead in Parkland, Fla., and an additional 14 are injured. As of Feb. 14, there have been 30 mass shootings in the U.S. this calendar year; 1,827 people have died because of gun violence. Continued mass shootings, particularly in schools, must end. The answer lies in sensible reforms to gun laws. Celebratory repetitions bring joy and meaning to our lives; repetitions of death from gun violence plague our minds and our spirits—we can do better as a people.

The Wonders and Evils of Facebook

Whatever happened to my 9th grade girlfriend, Veronica? I know, I'll do a search on Facebook. WOW! There she is. That's her. Three kids, five grandchildren, lives in Missouri. Boy did she get old. I didn't really search for my first love, but what better way to rediscover old friends, than Facebook?

Facebook is a marvelous way to keep current, even when months or years pass without direct contact. You can witness each other's life events, see photos of family members, let them know they're in your thoughts, etc.

There is also a negative side to Facebook. Besides the annoyance of people posting their strong political views, there has been extensive research conducted showing an increase in depression and lowered self-esteem due to too much Facebook time. Think about it. Most people post happy, smiling pictures of themselves having fun, doing things around town, enjoying vacations. People, especially kids, can get a skewed view of others and compare themselves to what they see on Facebook. The concept of "Facebook envy" has appeared in the literature because people compare their own life to what they see on their friends Facebook pages.

According to Dr. Hanna Krasnova, who led a social media study at the Humboldt University (Berlin), "In a world without social media, we would only be subject to our acquaintances' tantalizing vacation pictures if they were close friends and sitting down for a cup of coffee. In these cases, the richness of the honest-to-goodness interpersonal

communication would probably eclipse feelings of jealousy. But when it comes to online interaction, we're assaulted with the annoying highlights of the lives of every Tom, Dick, and Harry we've clicked a button to accept into our lives – whether they're actual friends, or people we've only met a time or two. Ironically, though we probably don't have offline



relationships with too many of our Facebook acquaintances, their online presence is enough to invoke the negative feelings, as we inevitably compare ourselves to them"

Our own Facebook page affords us the opportunity to post photos and our opinions, stand up for our beliefs, vent, and even ask for prayers. We can also react to what our friends post, but here's the possible pitfall — are we getting the complete story before giving praise and kudos?

If I post, "hey, great State of the Union speech! Love what the president said about building more nuclear plants, and exploring off-shore areas for oil and gas."

What thoughts are you having right now? If one of your friends had posted this, what would your reaction be? Be honest with yourself. How would you respond?

What if I told you these words WERE taken from the State of the Union Address, but in 2010? Now what are you thinking?

I may or may not see you on Facebook, but I will see you at temple!

Our Continuing Spiritual Leadership

Last month, I described our journey as a whitewater raft trip. Well now we are in still waters organizing for the next series of choppy waters. We did meet with Rabbi Roger Lerner from Feb. 20-22. Many of you provided your input via Survey Monkey. The Rabbi Search Committee did meet Tuesday, Feb. 27, to discuss the next steps in the process.

At this time, we are:

- Considering onsite visits to the congregations of the rabbis under consideration. A few members of the committee have offered to make the trips at their own expense.
- Bringing our preferred candidate(s) back to CBS for a second visit and negotiations.
- Finalizing the candidate selection and negotiations.
- Recommending our rabbinic leader to the board for consideration and vote.

Once these steps are completed, it is our goal to share our next rabbinic leader with you, the membership of Congregation Beth Shalom. I would expect that an announcement will be made in late March or early April.

Rabbi Address will be with us on the Shabbat weekend of March 9 and 10, while Cantor Friedler will be leading us through our second night Passover Seder on March 31. So many members of our Ritual Committee, under the leadership of Steve Slavkin, continue to provide spiritual leadership during our weekly Shabbat services.

Further, our youth's spiritual journey and education has not been interrupted. Keren Vergon has assumed the B'Nai Mitzvah duties normally handled by our rabbi. With Keren's dedication, our children will, in no way, miss a step in the preparation for their special day. 

Loigman's debut novel is an engrossing family saga set in post-war Brooklyn. It focuses on two families that are inextricably linked by blood, marriage, and a long-held secret. Brothers Abe and Mort took over their family box business when their father died, even though Mort had his heart set on studying mathematics. The brothers and their family

lies share a two-family house. As the story opens in 1947, wives Rose and Helen are themselves as close as sisters, happily bringing up their children together. Rose and Mort have three young daughters, and Helen and Abe, on the top floor, are bringing up four sons. Then, the two women get pregnant at the same time, deliver their babies together during a horrible blizzard, and make an instant decision to swap the babies that will change all of their lives forever. The story follows the families through decades.

Loigman's use of shifting perspectives allows readers to witness first-hand the growing consequences of long-festering secrets and the insidious lies that cover them up. This historical family drama has a dark underbelly, but Loigman's decision to let the reader in on the secret allows the setting and mood of the novel take over as the characters move haltingly toward redemption and peace.


With the book discussion, a light dinner will be offered. Our moderator for the evening will be Sheila Fishman.

As we approach the last several months of our school year, I want to take the time to remind everyone of our mission and vision statements.

Vision Statement

The Congregation Beth Shalom Religious School strives to lay a strong foundation of Jewish knowledge in order to produce lifelong Jewish learners who are committed to a Jewish community.

Mission Statement

The mission of Congregation Beth Shalom Religious School is to inspire in students

commitment to avodah (prayer and spiritual growth), to Torah (study), to tikkun olam and gemilut hasadim (repair of the world and acts of loving kindness) through the learning and experience of Jewish texts, holidays, rituals, values, and history.

In order to be successful, our students must attend sessions with consistence. Classes are held Sunday from 9:30 a.m. - 12 p.m. for all students. Our 4th-, 5th- & 6th-graders also attend Wednesdays from 6:15-7:45 p.m. Our Judaic curriculum builds upon past lessons. If a student has multiple absences, it will result in gaps in their Jewish education. The Hebrew curriculum is a prayer-based one. Our students are exposed to Hebrew letters and vowels with the goal of giving them the skills to be active participants in Shabbat and holiday services. We have a limited amount of time with our students. If they do not attend regularly, their Judaic and/or Hebrew education may be compromised.

Please refer to the following information from our Policy and Procedure Handbook.

In order for your child to maximize his/her Jewish education, it is essential that attendance is a family priority. Please contact Amy Weinstein to report your child's absence. Teachers will maintain attendance records for each student. If a student is absent for two consecutive sessions, or if a pattern of absences occurs the teacher or religious school director will contact the family.

Students are expected to make-up any missed assignments due to an absence. Repeated absences may result in additional assignments or a project to cover the missed work.

A MITZVAH TO READ A MISHNAH?

Pirkei Avot is a collection of ethical writings and maxims from the rabbis. Pirkei Avot loosely translates as "Chapters of the Fathers," though I think of it as "Chapters (or Ethics) of the People." (This gender neutral twist on the title will surprise no one who knows me.)

Pirkei Avot is six short chapters that are easy to read and filled with ethical degrees worth grappling with in our contemporary lives. As one example, the words, "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? And when I am for myself, what am 'I'? And if not now, when?" are found in the first chapter of • Sunday April 29: Chapter 4 the Pirkei Avot and in the second chapters readers will find, "It is not incumbent upon you to complete the work, but neither are you at liberty to desist from it." One tradition is to read the

Pirkei Avot in the weeks between Pesach and Shavuot.

This year at Congregation Beth Shalom, people interested in reading Pirkei Avot together between Pesach and Shavuot will gather Sunday mornings from 9:30 am until 10:30 am to discuss a chapter of the book. All are invited to join in these lively and reflective discussions about Jewish ethics inspired by reading Pirkei Avot.

Here is the schedule:

- Sunday April 8: Chapter 1
- Sunday April 15: Chapter 2
- Sunday April 22: Chapter 3
- Sunday May 6: Chapter 5 & 6

(We will combine the last two chapters to avoid Mother's Day.) Join any or all of the meetings. No commitment re-


quired, no prerequisites to enter. Come if you have read the chapter—and come if you haven't. Jewish ethics are for everyone. We will examine these ethics together and consider how they relate to our lives today.

DONATIONS

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- Building Fund: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- **Endowment Fund:** Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- Religious School Scholarship Fund: These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- Rabbi's Discretionary Fund: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.
- Youth Group Fund: a fund that supports the ongoing engagement of post b'nai mitzvah youth, providing meaningful and fun experiences for our teens, and keeping them connected to their Jewish community.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- Bricklets: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- Tree of Life: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- Yahrzeit Plaque: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$250. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.
