From the Rabbi

Why do we do Yizkor?

Elie Wiesel wrote of his first trip back to his home village of Sighet, where almost no Jews were left: "I met a Jew, one of the rare survivors, and we walked through the cemetery of Sighet. 'To be a Jew,' I asked, 'what does it mean to you? Does it mean turning your heart into a cemetery? 'No,' my companion said. 'The heart of a man is a sanctuary... To be a Jew is to fill the sanctuary with light, without betraying the cemetery." (Rabbi David Stern in Yizkor: Memory and Memorializing in Judaism, ed. Rabbi Lawrence A. Hoffman)



What a beautiful and perfect description of *Yizkor*, the memorial service that takes place on key Jewish festivals, most notably for us, on Yom Kippur. We fill the sanctuary—the walls of our building, our own hearts, and our own lives—with light; with our commitment to the rituals of our tradition, with a love that is stronger than death, with our dedication to honor the past in the names we pass on to our children, in the *tzedakah* we give in memory, in the values we inherit and exhibit. In embracing the lives we have been given, the foundations of which generations of our family have laid for us, we fill the sanctuary with light. We live fully – without betraying the cemetery.

Why on Yom Kippur, this holiest of days? On a day in which we evaluate who we are and who we wish to become – how can we not remember those who came before us? Parents, spouses, siblings, children, friends who live no longer... all of their lives are intertwined with ours, have shaped us and molded us. The act of memory that is at the heart of *yizkor* is especially poignant on a day in which we are acutely aware of our own mortality, our own frailty.

How do we do Yizkor?

The expanded *Yizkor* prayers that are included in *Mishkan HaNefesh* reflect the diversity of our relationships with music of consolation, words of healing, and moments of silence. We will, of course, read the names submitted to be in the *yizkor* book. In addition, I invite you once again to submit a memory of a loved one on a *yizkor* card. A teaching, a moment of humor, the advice she "always" gave, the precious memory you hold dear. In interweaving these words (anonymously) we strengthen our bonds with the real people whom we remember, and invite them to be fully present in our midst through the blessing of memory. There are other ways to honor those you remember: through purchasing a *yahrtzeit* plaque, dedicating a prayer book in their honor, or giving *tzedakah* in their name, you engage in sacred acts honoring your loved ones.

And what happens after Yizkor?

Beth Shalom has begun to look seriously at the question of a congregational cemetery – a place where our members and their families – can be laid to rest with dignity in a Jewish setting. Traditionally one of the first things that Jewish communities see to, it demands our attention. As we commit to the annual ritual of the *yizkor* service on Yom Kippur, so must we commit to a place for our loved ones to be buried, a place that will remain for generations to come. 

Have you ever wondered why the music of the High Holy Days sounds different from our Shabbat melodies? I know this question is often posed. Why doesn't the choir or cantor sing the Barechu, the Shema, the MiChamocha and other sacred texts the way we do on Friday evenings?

Cantor Kay Greenwald, Director of Placement for the American Conference of Cantors puts a good slant on this question in her article, <u>Why Is The Music Different</u> During the High Holidays?

She says that the reason has much to do with our diaspora. When Jews left their homelands and migrated elsewhere, they took what possessions they could. One of their greatest possessions was their vocal music, music that was significant for days of the week, Shabbat and Holy Days.

These melodies were called Missinai, 'from Sinai.' These Missinai tunes can be traced to the eleventh through the fifteenth centuries. We have records of them. As she states, "These melodies are considered to be among our people's most sacred possessions, so the time to use them would be most appropriate and powerful during the most sacred time of the year... These melodies evoke something different than our regular Shabbat worship. They evoke remembrances of ages past, of wonder at the mysteries of the universe, of lives lived and lost – heroically – in utter faith and devotion to our people and to our God... Through this music we preserve our people's history and our spiritual legacy."

The rabbis from the second century onward believed the world was a miracle constantly unfolding. They also believed that the singing voice was intrinsically holy, holy because it comes from breath. And where does breath come from? Breath comes from God.

May we too use our breath in the songs of our people, past and present. May we use our voices to lift our spirits, and to celebrate God's Presence in our lives, in the life of Israel and in the life of the whole world.

During the weekend of October 16, the Lifelong Learning Committee will be presenting Rabbi Deborah R. Prinz to our congregation as part of the Scholar in Residence program.


















The Social Action Committee had its official meeting on August 10, and had a

Donations

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- Building Fund: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- Endowment Fund: Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/ restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- Religious School Scholarship Fund: These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- Rabbi's Discretionary Fund: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- Bricklets: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- **Tree of Life**: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- Yahrzeit Plaque: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$250. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.

Unless otherwise noted by you, your gift will be acknowledged in the Kibbitzer the month following its receipt. If your donation is incorrectly listed or omitted, please notify the temple office immediately.
