From the Rabbi By: Rabbi Betsy Torop

It's well-known that Jews are preoccupied with food! How appropriate that March is filled with these upcoming nourishing events!

Food for the Mind . . .

Every year when we turn back to the beginning of Torah and the story of creation, someone asks me how we can believe and understand Torah as "true" given what we know about evolution. Even our



youngest students ask this question, albeit in their own way. ("Rabbi, we read about the creation of the world in the Torah, but what about the dinosaurs?") At its deepest level, this question challenges us to unite the religious and faith aspects of our identity with the knowledge and insight that the most up-to-date scientific research has provided. This is essential work for modern 21st-century Jews if we are to assert the importance of our sacred text without abandoning our identity as modern, intelligent people. Dr. Clifford Will, a member of the National Academy of Science and a Distinguished Professor of Physics at the University of Florida, will address these questions, along with the most up-to-date thinking about Big Bang Cosmology, in a special presentation on March 23.

Food for the Body . . .

The Second Annual Noshfest is almost here! Bringing together hundreds of Jews and non-Jews from across the Tampa Bay region to eat and to learn about Jewish holidays, our first Noshfest was a huge success. This year's event should be equally wonderful, featuring vendors, holiday booths, music, synagogue tours and collection of canned food for Tampa Jewish Family Services and ECHO. Noshfest is unique — it provides an easy and fun way to introduce others to Beth Shalom, to the joy of Jewish community and to celebration. Some of the best aspects of our congregation and of Jewish life are highlighted at Noshfest, so mark March 30 on your calendar, and plan to bring a friend and join us. We also need your help; the event is only possible with lots and lots of volunteer participation. Sign up to be involved, and take a yard sign to help us advertise the event as well!

Food for the Spirit . . .

I don't know who first said, "Laughter is the best medicine," but there is a very old Jewish expression that echoes that sentiment. "When (the Hebrew month of) Adar begins, joy increases." This year there are *two* months of Adar, and the first day of the second Adar, the month is which Purim falls, begins on March 3. Not only is Purim itself a day of laughter, but that laughter — at the absurd king, at the beauty pageant that elects a nice Jewish girl as queen, at the villain who is hung on his own gallows — spills over to the whole month. The story of Purim is the story of danger and perseverance — a serious tale of Jewish survival wrapped up in a silly story. Our annual Purim shpiel on March 15 (*The Megillah of the Seven Seas*), written by Anna Brubaker and acted by our dedicated Beth Shalom players, will nourish our spirits with laughter — the best medicine of all.

As stereotypical Jewish mothers like to say, "Eat, Eat". . . your mind, body and spirit will be nourished as a result! \Box

From the President - Hank Mart

Did you know that Board Meetings are open to the entire congregation? Yes it's true! You may come to view the Temple's financial records, and you are welcome to discuss an issue that may be near and dear to your heart. You can even come just to observe the meeting. If you would like an item added to the agenda, please contact our secretary, Toby Koch, and she will make sure it gets added for discussion. We meet on the first Tuesday of every month, and the meetings last about an hour and a half. Come: you just might find your niche!

How does attending a board meeting tie together with my short series of about "Team?" For our congregation to function properly, our goals are to provide for *everyone's* Jewish needs and ask for *everyone's* participation in meeting those goals. So this month's piece deals with the letter "E," for "*Everyone*," and how it relates to the congregation's vision:

Our vision is to provide you with opportunities for life-long study of Torah; to provide you with opportunities for Avodah (worship); and to provide you with opportunities for Gemilut Chasadim (deeds of love and kindness).

In order to fulfill these community-wide goals, it takes the participation of the entire community. Take, for example, the topic of hosting an upcoming Oneg. You might think this is a simple affair, but let us examine this more closely. The Oneg Committee lead by Anna Feldman, Judith Pliner, and Anita Hoffman must coordinate the dates, provide instructions on what to bring, and discuss duties and responsibilities with the Oneg host. Seems easy enough, but what if hosts did not know they needed to bring wine and challah? Why, the entire congregation would die of thirst and of hunger! We couldn't let this happen, could we? By the way, the Oneg fits into the category of Gemilut Chasadim (deeds of love and kindness).

Another example of *everyone* working together is how our religious school functions. There are numerous people involved in providing a Jewish education to our youth. Amy Weinstein, the Religious School Director, and Karen Blanchard, Curriculum Coordinator, provide the leadership to the religious school. While our teachers (Leslie Mazen, Marcia Lome, Pam

Provenzano, Dan Weinstein and Lauren Weisman) provide instruction on a weekly basis to nearly 70 students. In addition, the Parent Association led by Natasha Reiger provides feedback to the staff and temple leadership in order to have a more meaningful learning environment for our children. Our



religious school is another fine example of *everyone* working together while providing an opportunity for life-long study of Torah starting with our youth.

I highly encourage *everyone* to express his/her ideas and feeling on how to improve our congregation and to be a part of the solution! The Temple needs you to get involved!

The book was a critical success for Roth and won the 1960 U.S. National Book Award for Fiction.

To begin the process, email or call the office. If space is available on the requested date, you will be forwarded a Facility Usage Agreement, a part of which is your specific, formal request. A rate sheet is included. For members, lifecycle events such as baby namings, b'nai mitzvahs, weddings, and memorials are free and part of your membership; however if you wish to use the facility for a private event, there is small fee.

The completed request form is to be returned to the office for processing — *even if there is no fee*. Once the event is approved, you will be notified, and any details specific to your event will be discussed.

A significant portion of this notification discussion will be covering the "After-Event Facilities Checkout Form." This is very important. Keep this form until the completion of your event, and then submit it. It is as important for you as it is for temple. If, after your event, items on the list are not found as they should be, fees may be incurred. It's important that you count into your event time the completion of the checklist at the end of the event, or entrust this task to a specific individual you can count on.

The checklist covers everything from the sound system to trash disposal, top to bottom, side to side — the Buildings & Grounds Committee really did an excellent job putting this document together making sure to cover all aspects of the facility. It also includes a section for you to share any comments that you feel need to be brought to the attention of the office (if something was broken, or if something was working improperly, etc.).

If this will be an unstaffed event, and you as the host are assuming the responsibility for it, you will be granted a temporary key to the facility and be trained in how to open and close the facility prior to the event. This is an exclusive benefit for members.

The facility is also available to rent for non-members; however, the event(s) also must be cleared through the office and Board of Directors. Fees are not waived for non-member-hosted events, and staff or a congregant (who agrees to take responsibility for the event) must be on site.

The Seven Stages of Creation: Religion Meets the Big Bang

Can science and religion really co-exist? In the Will family it can. Dr. Will is not just a member of Beth Shalom; he is also the father of Betsy Torop, the synagogue's rabbi. As the congregation's spiritual leader, Rabbi Torop is often asked how the Torah (the Jewish Bible) can be true given what is known about evolution.

In his lecture, Dr. Will describes the current model of Big Bang Cosmology and will give up-to-date, best answers to questions like "How old is the universe?" and "Will it expand forever?" Dr. Will also describes the essential differences between how science and religion work.

Dr. Clifford Will is the Distinguished Professor of Physics at the University of Florida. He is a Fellow of the American Physical Society and a member of the U.S. National Academy of Sciences.

Donations

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- Building Fund: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- Endowment Fund: Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- Religious School Scholarship Fund: These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- Rabbi's Discretionary Fund: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- Bricklets: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a
 card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent
 to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her
 name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- Tree of Life: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180 and stones are \$1800.
- Yahrzeit Plaque: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$250. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.

Unless otherwise noted by you, your gift will be acknowledged in the Kibbitzer the month following its receipt. If your donation is incorrectly listed or omitted, please notify the temple office immediately.
