#### FROM THE RABBI - Rabbi Bryan Mann

# <u>Teshuva: What is it</u> and How Do we Make it?

During Eul, Rosh Hashanah, the 10 Days of Awe, and Yom Kippur, we talk a lot about teshuva, a Hebrew word commonly translated as repentance, but can also mean repair and return. The idea being that as you make repentance, you begin to repair your relationship with the person you hurt and return to a better version of yourself. According to Rambam, the medieval Sephardic Jewish philosopher also known as Maimonides, complete repentance is when a person has the opportunity to make the same mistake and refrains from



doing so. How do we get there? How do we get to the point where we are given the same opportunity to make the same mistake and refrain from doing so?

Rabbi David J. Blumenthal in his article for My Jewish Learning, "Spiraling Toward Repentance" compiles five necessary steps Jewish tradition requires to make teshuva:

- 1. Recognition of one's sins as sins
- 2. Remorse
- 3. Desisting from sin
- 4. Restitution when possible
- 5. Confession

Each of these steps according to Rabbi Blumenthal demands something different from us. Recognition, requires thinking and intellect. We have to use our minds to know we've done wrong. Remorse is a feeling. We have to use our hearts to know we've done wrong. Desisting and restitution require action. We have to actively make choices to refrain from making the same mistake again and heal the hurt we caused. Confession requires speaking, we have to use our mouths to know we've done wrong.

It is important to note confession also requires community. When we confess our sins, our mistakes in the past year we do so as a community using plural language. "Al chet sh'chatanu, for the sins which we have sinned ..." We are responsible for each other. When one of us messes up we all mess up. This means, it is on us to teach each other, learn from one another, support one another's growth, and help correct each other's behavior when necessary.

After all, the Sages of the Talmud teach us that Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement only atones for sins between a person and the Divine. It is only when we approach each other, full of recognition and remorse, seeking teshuva, seeking to repair the hurt we've caused that we have truly made complete teshuva. It is through this recognition and remorse, that we know the next time, we might hurt that person in the same we, we will choose not to, because we recognize the pain it caused the first time.

# L'shana Tovah (to a good year) and G'mar Chatima Tovah (may you be inscribed for good)

As 5780 is upon us, I am hopeful things are beginning to turn for Congregation Beth Shalom. For example, this month is the first month I can remember the number of new and returning members exceeded the number of members that left. The rabbi has put together two separate adult education programs for the upcoming year. We are opening these programs to the community, free of charge. The religious school is in full swing. I am hopeful that we will remain on this trajectory. More importantly, by increasing our membership, we are able to better fulfill our mission and remain the center of Jewish Life in eastern Hillsborough County.

Notwithstanding, an increase in membership and programming, we are having unexpected expenses. We had to pay \$2,750 for removal of a tree in the back of our property and have had to pay additional funds to ensure the building complies with all fire codes and remains safe. These are just a few of the unexpected expenses we have faced. More importantly we need to replace our roof and hope to start this project in the near future. This will be an expensive but needed repair/improvement. However, these expenses are difficult to do, to the extent we have a negative cash flow for the year. As a result, any assistance that you could provide would be greatly appreciated. If you have not already done so, please remember to make some contribution to the High Holiday drive and consider increasing your gift from last year. We greatly need your assistance this year more than ever.

As for having a voice in the community, I was invited to meet with the Hillsborough County public schools' search committee, seeking a new superintendent along with a number of other community religious leaders. And while representing the interests of the Jewish community is always difficult to the extent we do not have a homogeneous community, I was clear that it was imperative the new superintendent understood the separation of church and state and ensure that the schools take the necessary efforts to ensure that proselytizing stays out of the schools. 

### Do you know Sandy Saviet?

As you probably know, Sandy is married to Howard Saviet. You probably met her at our chavurah or perhaps in the congregation library where she currently is organizing it. But here are some things about her you might not know.

Sandy, like her mother, was born and raised in Toledo, Ohio. Her grandparents came from Latvia and Romania. Arriving in the United States, Sandy's grandfa-



ther opened up a department store in Beloit, Wisconsin. Growing up her family always only travelled to cities where relatives lived for weddings and bar/bat mitzvahs, but every summer they spent three days at Cedar Point in Ohio and stayed at The Breakers Hotel. Sandy's father would take the kids to the amusement park while her mom would sit on the beach sunning herself.

While pursuing her bachelor's degree in social work at The

University of Cincinnati, Sandy was part of the A.M.A.C. (Ask Me About Cincinnati). She worked outside in a booth on Fountain Square assisting visitors with directions, answering questions about the city, promoting the downtown businesses and assisting at risk teenagers learn work skills. It was a summer job and hot working outside, but she got to dangle her feet in the fountain at the end of the shift.

#### **DONATIONS**

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

#### **Funds:**

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- Building Fund: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- Endowment Fund: Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- Religious School Scholarship Fund: These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- Rabbi's Discretionary Fund: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.
- Youth Group Fund: a fund that supports the ongoing engagement of post b'nai mitzvah youth, providing meaningful and fun experiences for our teens, and keeping them connected to their Jewish community.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

#### **Opportunities:**

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- Bricklets: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- **Tree of Life**: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- Yahrzeit Plaque: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$350. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.


