

### FROM THE RABBI - Rabbi Bryan Mann

### Tu BiShvat and Protecting the Earth

One of the earliest things we are told about humans in the Torah is that the Divine, "Placed Adam in the Garden of Eden to work it and protect it" (Genesis 2:15). The Hebrew word used is ששמר has connotations of protect, guard, and keep.



This one line in Genesis is not our only inspiration however. Every year we as Jews celebrate, "The New Year for the Trees" on the 15th of Sh'vat also known as Tu BiShvat. Just like Passover there is a dedicated seder for Tu BiShvat that often recognizes the gifts trees give us of food, shelter, breathable air, and so many other things. Some Tu BiShvat seders recognize the changing of the seasons. Many Jews have a custom of planting a tree in honor of Tu BiShvat.

We live in a world where it seems like every month there is another natural disaster. Whether the hurricanes some of us have personal experience of here at home, wildfires in Brazil and Australia, earthquakes in Puerto Rico, it feels like we have failed in our job as protectors. Sometimes the effects of a changing world are less disastrous. Unseasonably warm or cold temperatures around the country. These are all effects of our presence on this Earth and what we have and have not done to protect it.

The plans to curb and stop these effects to ensure a livable planet for future generations are vast. There are many different visions of what we as individuals and communities can do. It can be incredibly overwhelming and often feel paralyzing. "So many people are telling me, I need to do all of these things as an individual and I can only do so much." Other times the pessimism comes from a place of, "I am just one person. Does it really matter if I take a shorter shower or recycle?" It is easy to simply do nothing out of a sense that our actions will not make a significant difference in the long run.

Yet, one of these bold visions is simple, "Plant trees in specific areas to curb Co2 Emissions." Throughout social media in the recent weeks there is a picture that outlines precisely where we should be planting trees based on this article <a href="https://www.geographyrealm.com/mapping-where-planting-trees-can-help-with-climate-change-mitigation">https://www.geographyrealm.com/mapping-where-planting-trees-can-help-with-climate-change-mitigation</a>. As with any major issue of our time there are multiple visions, plans, and strategies. One very real truth is we do not know what will work until we try. We can seek out the advice of scientists, climate experts, and others who spend much of their lives studying and understanding these issues to inform these visions, plans, and strategies, but until we do something nothing is going to change.

We Jews have been planting trees as a ritual practice during Tu BiShvat, the New Year for Trees for a long time now. What might it look like to see this practice as one part of our fundamental mission of protecting this planet and how else might we fulfill that mission? Happy Tu BiShvat!

### FROM THE PRESIDENT - Jon Ellis

Saturday, Feb. 22, is our annual fundraiser, the Roaring Twenties Gala. If you have not bought your tickets yet or made arrangements to attend, please do so. It should be a lot of fun and the success of the event is critical for our fundraising. I am looking forward to seeing everyone there!

The rabbi search committee co-chairs have been working diligently and we are beginning to narrow the search. Once a candidate has been approved by the committee, we anticipate bringing that candidate in to meet the rest of the committee and the congregation. I would like to thank Shelia Fishman, Julie Enszer, and Michael Lubin for all the work they have done to date.

The dues committee has met again and we are getting closer to a determination whether we will revise our dues structure and if so, how. Many of us have come to the realization the current dues structure is no longer working. Our membership is declining and our revenue is dropping at an unstainable rate. If something does not change in the immediate future, it is questionable whether we will be able to remain as an ongoing concern. One of the models being discussed is a voluntary dues structure. In other words, would we obtain more revenue if the dues were voluntary? This system would only work if those paying dues continue to pay at the

current rate and we were able to attract additional new members who would also contribute. We hope to address this at the March board meeting and then at a special membership meeting. If there is support, I hope to bring this system before the membership at our annual meeting in June. If you have strong opinions on our dues structure, please let me know. The



goal of the committee is to ensure that our dues structure is not a hindrance to our increasing membership of fulfilling our mission.

I am pleased to announce that we should start to see the roof replaced in the next few weeks. This is a major expense but also needed to ensure our building stays in good repair.

Lastly, security remains paramount for us. We are working with the Tampa Jewish Federation and law enforcement to review the building and what we can do to ensure that we are taking necessary measures. It is important that we remain vigilant and report anything that appears out of the ordinary or suspicious.



### RABBI SEARCH COMMITTEE

As you may know, Jon Ellis named Sheila Fishman, Julie Enszer and Michael Lubin to serve as chairs for the rabbi search committee. The chairs have posted requests for resumes on multiple sites geared to rabbis in search of a position with a congregation with our demographics, needs and desire to grow and flourish. More than a dozen resumes were received. The three chairs met to review the documentation received and have narrowed the search to those most compatible with our congregational needs.

The chairs will be meeting with these individuals by video conferencing over the next few weeks. Many of these applicants reside in Florida, reducing our expenses should we decide to meet with any personally.

Once these online interviews are completed, we will provide information to the remaining search committee for their review and comments. If it is determined that an onsite visit is warranted, we will advise the board accordingly. You, our congregants, will be also be afforded an opportunity to meet with the prime candidates and provide your input.



### "We're Not Getting Any Younger" Series

This is a 5-part series about aging issues, presented by Life Long Learning.

You do not have to have attended previous sessions to take part in upcoming sessions.

  "Managing Living Arrangements as We
  Change." A representative from the Hillsborough
  County Senior Connection Center will address a
  variety of living arrangements which may be available
  to us as our needs change because of changes in health,
  including how we can access financial aid such as Medicaid.
- Part 5: Sunday, March 22, 7 p.m.: "Remains of the Day End of life Decisions." Panning can be so helpful when addressing end-of-life events. Charles Segal, director of Segal Funeral Home will help to inform us about what options are available to us, when we should make such decisions, and how they can be arranged. We will also address the role services such as Hospice can play.



We are told twice at the end of this parsha we are told twice, "It shall be a sign upon your hand and as a symbol before

your forehead." We will look more in depth at these passages and then look at how this is related to the mitzvah of tefillin. Those who wish will have the opportunity to learn how to wrap tefillin and learn why we do not wrap tefillin on Shabbat.

The evening will end with an oneg Shabbat sponsored by the religious school. Please mark this special evening on your calendar.







The Handmaid's Tale is the story of Offred, a Handmaid in the Republic of Gilead, a totalitarian and theocratic state that has replaced the United States of America. Because of dangerously low reproduction rates, Handmaids are assigned to bear children for elite couples that have trouble conceiving. Offred serves the Commander and his wife, Serena Joy, a former gospel singer and advocate for "traditional values." Offred is not the narrator's real name-Handmaid names consist of


the word "of" followed by the name of the Handmaid's Commander. Offred's freedom, like the freedom of all women, is completely restricted. She can leave the house only on shopping trips, the door to her room cannot be completely shut, and the Eyes, Gilead's secret police force, watch her every public move.

Margaret Atwood, whose work has been published in more than 40 countries, is the author of more than 50 books of fiction, poetry, and critical essays. Her novels include *Cat's Eye*, shortlisted for the Booker Prize; *Alias Grace*, which won the Giller Prize in Canada and the Premio Mondello in Italy; *The Blind Assassin*, winner of the 2000 Booker Prize; *Oryx and Crake*, shortlisted for the 2003 Booker Prize; *The Penelopiad; The Heart Goes Last; Hag-seed*; and *The Testaments*, a sequel to The Handmaid's Tale, published in September, 2019. She lives in Toronto some of the time.

### **DONATIONS**

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

### Funds:

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- Building Fund: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- Endowment Fund: Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- Religious School Scholarship Fund: These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- Rabbi's Discretionary Fund: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.
- Youth Group Fund: a fund that supports the ongoing engagement of post b'nai mitzvah youth, providing meaningful and fun experiences for our teens, and keeping them connected to their Jewish community.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

### **Opportunities:**

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- Bricklets: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- **Tree of Life**: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- Yahrzeit Plaque: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$350. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.
